Free Download: Sting is a GUI based network simulation package

There's a free network simulation package that's available for downloading at www.yellowjacket.ca. The company is giving away copies of the prototype of their flagship product in hopes of testing market viability.

The two components in the package are the editor and the player. The idea is that you start off by composing a simulation in the editor, and then use the player to animate the simulation.

Here are highlights on the package features:

- protocol support includes modeling of: logical channels, messages, timers, state machines and stack hierarchies
- built-in support for message ladder diagrams, signal strength monitoring and channel monitoring
- simple to animate message flows, state machines, stack hierarchies and mobile drive paths
- trigger-based simulations with easy-to-use editor timeline and player runtime control
- hooks for incorporating real-world testing hardware into simulations
- simulations that can be created are protocol independent
- editor and player are built underneath a GUI for ease of use

Getting the Show on the Road: Mobile Computing from Infowave and Microsoft

Evan is the vice president of sales for a major multinational computing conglomerate. In a normal business year, he spends 6 months a year in transit (in planes, trains and taxi-mobiles). Efficient logistical management is essential to managing his life. Evan and his staff simply have to be at the right place at the right time, with the right information. Tonight Evan is in London England, racing to the airport for a flight back to NYC. Back home in Toronto his inbox has received two new meeting invitations for next week. A regional director has identified a credible sales lead for a multi-year, multimillion with a potential client in San Francisco. A meeting on the client's site has been scheduled back-to-back to an emergency meeting that Evan's CEO has called. There seems to be a revenue leakage that is pointing straight back to sales being generated by his group. There is speculation circulating around post-sales incentive pay rollbacks being put around the sales compensation.

The story of Evan the VP is a fictional one. But it very well could sound uncomfortably familiar to a lot of busy professionals. In an ideal situation Evan would have received both meeting invitations on his PDA immediately after they appeared on his calendar. Vancouver based Infowave Software has come to the rescue with its Wireless Business Engine (WBE). WBE 4.6 is a middleware solution that will allow secure access to enterprise systems through mobile computing devices operating on Windows platform. By providing full two-way calendar management with MS Exchange, Evan can review incoming meeting invitations in a timely manner, as well as propose changes while he's on the road. In addition to being able to manage his calendar, he'll be able to use email and access the internal employee directory in its current state; he won't be making do with static capture of the directory from his last live visit into the office. More importantly this middleware application offers increased security for synching to enterprise servers through authenticated Intranet access and client-server applications over remote connections of all types, including cellular, Wi-Fi and dial-up.

"Today's release (of WBE 4.6) better positions the company to take advantage of a enterprise mobile application market opportunity sized at US\$1.2 billion dollars this year." Infowave CEO & President Jerry Meerkatz.

Organizations that are currently using WBE include Hydro One, Shell Oil, Unilever and the U.S. Navy.
